- Eleven Years' Tyranny


Charles I & Puritans

- Church attendance laws enforced more Puritans flee persecution
- Imposed Church of England on Scotland religious war with Scotland
- The Long Parliament Charles I called it back into session to get money for his war

English Civil War begins - Roundheads versus Cavaliers

Charles I is executed at Whitehall - family flees to France

Oliver Cromwell, Protestant, becomes the Lord Protector of England - a new position
